


GIRLS CHANGE THE WORLD:

Global Action Team Takes On Climate Change

When girls come together in pursuit of a common goal, they're unstoppable. We see this each year on the Global Action Team – a group of Girl Scout Seniors and Ambassadors (9th through 12th graders) selected to work together and advocate for issues that impact girls across the world.

This year's theme was climate change and endangered species. For six months, the girls on the Global Action Team planned the annual Global Action Summit, a weekend retreat for nearly 100 Cadette Girl Scouts (6th through 8th graders). The team created hands-on activities demonstrating how human actions impact the ocean, the atmosphere and wildlife.

Your support helps girls elevate these projects from blueprints for advocacy to leadership in action. Girls leave the annual summit energized to organize behind a cause and inspire others to act – creating change for the better.



CELEBRATING 90 YEARS OF CAMP

When Helena and Harry Robbins moved from Minnesota to Washington in 1925 to support the family business, they came with their five children in tow, including two daughters and a passion for Girl Scouting.

While Harry oversaw logging operations for the Hama Hama Company, Helena became an early leader of the Girl Scout movement in Seattle. Today, camp is one of her greatest legacies.

In 1928, Helena arranged for the Girl Scouts to purchase more than 400 acres of land along the Hood Canal from the Hama Hama Company – the site that became Camp Robbinswold.

For the past 90 years, generations of girls have made lasting memories and lifelong friendships at Camp Robbinswold. Helena's generosity lives on through the Hama Hama Company (yes, the company known today for its oysters!), which continues to provide access to its private land for girls to explore on kayaking, canoeing and hiking adventures.

As we celebrate the 90th anniversary of Girl Scout camp in western Washington, we extend our gratitude to the Hama Hama Company and the late Helena Robbins for her enduring love of Girl Scouting and the great outdoors!
