Process	What It Means	Why It Works	What It Looks Like
Girl Led	Girls make decisions and choices about what they do and how they do it.	Girls feel they "own" their group and experiences. They'll also have more fun.	Girls plan, organize, and implement their travel projects with as little adult intervention as possible.
Learning by Doing	Girls have opportunities for hands-on activities followed by reflection and discussion time.	Girls strengthen their critical-thinking skills and are more likely to apply what they learn to their lives.	Girls reflect on what they're experiencing by journaling and being part of group discussions.
Cooperative Learning	Girls work towards a common goal as well as gain knowledge and skills in an atmosphere of respect and cooperation.	Girls build healthy relationships and communicate effectively. This will help in their travel experiences and in other areas of their lives. Plus, cooperative learning is fun!	Girls create a team agreement, reflect, and speak openly and often about how they are functioning as a team. Girls set group goals that can only be achieved through interdependent efforts (e.g., sharing resources, helping)
